Dear Sen. Klobuchar, Sen. Scott, Sen. Peters, and Sen. Capito,

I'm writing on behalf of the Major Cities Chiefs Association (MCCA) to register our support for S. 987, the *Providing Resources for Exceptional Veterans to End Narcotic Trafficking of Fentanyl (PREVENT Fentanyl) Act.* The MCCA is a professional organization of law enforcement executives representing the largest cities in the United States and Canada.

The HERO Corps program trains wounded, ill, or injured veterans to serve as computer forensic analysts to assist with investigations involving crimes against children. However, DHS has reported that because of the program's exclusive focus on child exploitation, HERO Corps members experience secondary trauma, which creates significant burnout, amongst other challenges.

S. 987 will expand the focus of the HERO Corps to include fentanyl trafficking investigations. This will not only bolster the impact of the program, but it will also help align it with best practices regarding health and wellness for individuals tasked with investigating crimes against children. For example, given the heinous nature of these crimes and the material investigators are exposed to, many MCCA members limit the amount of time an investigator can work on these types of cases before requiring them to move to another assignment.

While the *PREVENT Fentanyl Act* will undoubtedly improve the program, the MCCA encourages Congress to look closely at further expanding the types of investigations HERO Corps members support. It is important to recognize that many of the program's participants have already experienced significant trauma during their military service to our nation.
