Dear Rep. Ivey,

I'm writing on behalf of the Major Cities Chiefs Association (MCCA) to register our support for H.R. 4958, the *Kenneth P. Thompson Begin Again Act*. The MCCA is a professional organization of law enforcement executives representing the largest cities in the United States and Canada.

The MCCA has long advocated for common sense criminal justice reform that properly balances providing relief to non-violent offenders while ensuring those offenders who represent a threat to public safety are held accountable for their actions. The *Kenneth P. Thompson Begin Again Act* is an example of reform that achieves this balance.

Under current law (18 U.SC. §3607), an individual can have a simple possession offense expunged from their criminal record if they meet specific criteria, including being 21 years of age or younger at the time of the offense. When looking at the criteria for expungement as a whole, it becomes clear that the current age limit is an arbitrary cutoff. Individuals who can meet the rest of the stringent requirements in 18 U.SC. §3607 should be eligible to have the simple possession offense on their record expunged, regardless of how old they are. By removing the age requirement currently in statute, H.R. 4958 will help make our criminal justice system fairer and more equitable.
